
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Editorial

Tourism to France is recovering after two difficult years, which has inspired us for the theme of this latest edition of Destination France. The desire to visit France is growing again, and bearing signs of fruitful seasons ahead.

France is like a vast garden of new ideas in several fields, be it in art, fashion, architecture, or cinema. We invite you to take advantage of this flourishing yet deep-rooted artistic milieu and discover a new side of France each time you travel.

Gardens have been an inspiration for walkers and artists since antiquity, and are conducive to relaxation, poetic multi-sensorial experiences, and sharing. After admiring the work of the great Impressionist painters, many images of France stay with us: Renoir's Luncheon on the Grass, Monet's water lilies, Van Gogh's sunflowers, Gauguin's French Polynesian landscapes, and the passionate garden paintings by the indefatigable Caillebotte.

The biodiversity of the French regions is a veritable treasure. Botanical interest began budding in the 19th century, partly due to voyages to the West Indies, where the abundant vegetation inspired the public botanical gardens. Over time, several labels have been created to recognize and reward the work of cities and landscape architects in their integrated approach to preserving this biodiversity.

Landscape architecture also contributes to the embellishment of heritage sites, which are numerous in France. Who hasn't been enchanted by the gardens of the châteaux in the Loire Valley, or those in Îlede-France? These immense parks like the ones at Château de Chantilly and Château de Versailles were designed by André Le Nôtre, who helped build not only the reputation of the French-style garden, but also the splendour of the Sun King.

Vegetal design has been elevated to an art form, expressed with great creativity, and contributing to the French quality of life, not to mention the travellers' delight. Think of the greenways of Paris, of the integration of public art in the parks of Nantes and on the shores of the Loire, and of Patrick Blanc's spectacular vertical gardens in Paris, Avignon and Lyon.

Urban greening is an inevitable trend that is being integrated in all the renovation projects throughout France's big cities, like the industrial isles in Nantes (Green Capital in 2013), the port in Marseille (European Capital of Culture in 2013), and the vibrant project for Bordeaux 2030.

This is why Atout France published "Valoriser la nature en ville," the fourth publication in the "Rendezvous en ville" collection, which focuses on urban tourism and valorizing nature in cities as a strategic element in destination tourism. You will find some excerpts from this publication throughout this press kit.

You'll also be charmed by the bouquet of offers presented by the destinations and partners of *Destination France in Bloom*, which include the parks and gardens of France, as well as outdoor events in memorable green settings. And so we invite you on a delightful stroll around this extraordinary garden, that of France and its overseas regions.

The Role of Gardens in France

The history of gardens in France: from Roman times to now

There were two main types of gardens in Roman times: very large spaces in the countryside and much smaller indoor gardens in cities. These green areas were used mainly as vegetable gardens, but were also conducive to religious practice.

Gardens quickly became proof of civilization, and were located near dwellings. During the medieval period they became veritable symbols: nature was more spiritual than material.

More and more green spaces were created during the Renaissance era, with people reconnecting with their origins and placing Antiquity at the heart of their gardens.

Several mostly-private botanical gardens were created for the transmission of knowledge, and were greatly appreciated by pharmacists. Box trees were their main element, though stone and water also played dominant roles in their landscape. The first green labyrinths also made their appearance during the Renaissance.

In the 17th century, gardens were becoming a real extension of architecture. André Le Nôtre's French gardens were an inspiration for a style that spread throughout France. Large parterres, or garden

beds, were built around a central axis and the use of geometric shapes was becoming increasingly common.

The Enlightenment in the 18th century gave way to a more British style, inspired by paintings and theatre, and a contrast to what already existed in France. As a symbol of emancipation vis-à-vis the monarchy, art was the basis of this new impulse where gardeners let nature rule, creating gardens with more irregular shapes and a less delicate aesthetic. Nature's imperfections and the association of several plant species were at the forefront of this blooming style.

Public gardens emerged in the 19th century, in Paris, as Napoleon wanted to "air out" the capital. Numerous parks and squares were built to accompany the industrial revolution, including the Bois de Vincennes and the Buttes-Chaumont gardens. Provincial towns quickly followed suit, with the Thabor in Rennes and the Tête d'Or in Lyon being some of the era's greatest creations. Technical progress led to the development of large greenhouses, which in turn helped in the expansion of tropical plant species.

More recently, old-style gardens have been replaced by contemporary ones, which are now often referred to as green spaces. After the two world wars, reconstruction was focused on buildings without taking into consideration any particular garden design. It was only in the 1980s that landscape architects began to see nature as a priority once again.

André Le Nôtre: The King of Gardeners and the Gardener of Kings



Louis XIV's famous gardener, André Le Nôtre, is best known for his landscaping of the Château de Versailles parks and gardens. He also worked, however, on the Jardins des Tuileries, the gardens at Château de Vaux-le-Vicomte and Château de Chantilly.

Born in 1613, Le Nôtre grew up in a nature-loving family. He was first noticed as a gardener when he was 22 years old, and quickly thereafter acquired a series of prestigious contracts.

Jardins du Château de Versailles

Founder of the "jardin à la française," this style became Le Nôtre's trademark. His gardens, characterized by geometric curves and a limitless perspective, were a successful marriage of art and technique. His mission was simple: to surprise visitors. By adorning his creations with fountains and statues of all kinds, the gardener created a world of enchantment.

His fame took him across borders, to England where he designed gardens, notably in Greenwich. In 1675, Louis XIV ennobled him. He pursued his work at Versailles until 1693, when he retired near his family and continued working on smaller projects until his death, in 1700.

To celebrate the 400 years of his birth in 2013, the "International André Le Nôtre Award" was developed in his honour. It rewards landscape architects from around the world for their contribution throughout their career, from their early ideas to final creations.





The attraction of nature in cities

There has been resurgence in the popularity of urban green spaces over the past few years. Parks in cities are multiplying, as are ephemeral gardens and green walls. Nature has always played an important role in the attractiveness of an urban destination, and although green spaces don't necessarily bring new clienteles, they are essential when it comes to developing loyalty from returning visitors. Nature can affect travellers in several different ways. We all know the environmental benefits, but green spaces also



seduce with their aesthetics, and can even become a destination's must-see. More and more old, unused buildings and abandoned sites are being reconverted into green spaces. The goal is simple: to revitalize little-used areas and invite local populations to revive these spaces.

The biodiversity of cities

The biodiversity of cities has long been anecdotal, though it has recently been the focus of more concrete attention. In fact, several vegetal spaces have integrated and adapted to their urban environments, making awareness and special efforts now necessary to help preserve these "made for city" varieties.

Capitalizing on nature to attract visitors

During an event, the scenography of a garden, park or any other green space presents a whole new facet of a familiar place. Take Nantes, for example, which transformed its botanical garden during the summer of 2013, or Boulogne-sur-Mer, which welcomed an ephemeral garden in its city centre.

More and more, cities are using nature to help bring forward their destinations.

Dedicated labels

It has become essential to create labels related to green spaces, and many exist today to help promote landscaping policies and encourage cities.

The EcoJardin Label



Created in 2012, it certifies public and private sites open to the public. This label is based on eco-management criteria divided up into eight fields according to some 100 key points. The certification, once obtained, is valid for three years. In 2017, 128 new sites were awarded the label, bringing the total of France's EcoJardins up to 392.



BiodiverCity

With 80% of the world population expected to live in cities by 2050, the integration of biodiversity into buildings is an important challenge for the future. The mission of the BiodiverCity label is to evaluate and display the ecological performance of buildings.



Remarkable Gardens

Created in 2003 by the National Parks and Gardens Council, this label promotes green spaces that boast particularly unique landscaping. It is awarded for a period of five years, and is based on various criteria, including composition, botanical interest and the history of the parks and gardens.



Villes et village fleuris

Launched in the 1960s, this label's main mission was to promote places through their aesthetics. It has since evolved and now encourages landscaping strategies that focus on environmentally responsible practices. To this day, more than 4,700 municipalities have been labelled with a status of one to four flowers.

Urban Greening: many projects' success

The Island of Nantes

The urban redevelopment project for the Island of Nantes was launched 20 years ago as part of the city's restructuring policy. The project aims to improve the urban landscape and build a city of tomorrow, showcasing large open spaces in a remarkable environmental setting.

By combining all aspects of city life (housing, economic development, culture, entertainment...), with a focus on sustainable development and innovation, the project hopes to create a strong urban metropolitan centre.

Bordeaux 2030

The urban renewal project of Bordeaux's Grand Parc was started in June 2016. The project is being developed by Bordeaux Métropole in collaboration with the Bordeaux City Council.



The missions for Bordeaux 2030 are as follows:

- Lead the urban project and offer Bordeaux residents a sustainable territory and neighbourhoods;
- Contribute to the evolution of the Local Urban Planning documents according to the urban project, in collaboration with the Bordeaux Urban Community;
- Encourage the architectural quality of projects;
- Implement the management plan for the UNESCO World Heritage Site;
- Lead the project to renew the city's historical centre;
- Organize Agora, Bordeaux's architecture, planning and design biennial.

Marseille: the "New Old Port"

Marseille has a privileged location and lies in an exceptional setting: between the sea, the hills and the Calanques cliffs. Half of the city's territory is made up natural spaces, with more than 400 hectares of parks and public gardens.

The second phase of the renovation of Marseille's Old Port has just been completed. The first part of Marseille's vast redevelopment project was delivered in time for the Marseille-Provence European Capital of Culture festivities, which began in January 2013.



This project, designed by landscape architect Michel Desvigne-Foster and Partners-Tangram-Ingerop-Yann Kersalé, aims to give a new life to this unique space, by prioritizing pedestrians and gentle modes of transport.

Brittany's Parks and Gardens Association

In 1988, Brittany's Parks and Gardens Association (APJB) was founded after the September 1987 hurricane that left a path of destruction. Since then, the APJB has been dedicated to protecting, restoring and enhancing the region's parks and gardens, on both plant heritage and decorative levels.

The Ballue Gardens

Since their creation in the 17th century, the Ballue Gardens have undergone many changes. Traversing 13 parcels of land, the first garden is landscaped to showcase multiple scenes throughout a labyrinthine course.



The Brocéliande Forest

The Brocéliande Forest is renowned as the source of numerous myths and legends. Merlin the Enchanter, King Arthur and the fairy Viviane are inseparable from this place. Get to know their stories and other historical gems with one of many organized hikes around this beautiful site.

- June to August: The Lieux Mouvants Festival

Each summer, the festival program includes innovative performances and visits of ephemeral gardens. Embark on a discovery tour of magical and unknown villages, gardens and sites.

The Avranches Plant Garden

The Etretat Garden

This is a magical place overlooking the sea. Recently opened, these gardens at Etretat are resolutely avant-garde: a marriage of modern art, design and lush green landscapes that respect the park's original poetic dimension and spirit.

Claude Monet's Gardens

These gardens were home to Claude Monet, and also his greatest source of inspiration. Art lovers will be awestruck by the Nympheas Workshop, while nature enthusiasts will marvel at the gardens. Glycine and azaleas enliven the park, giving this glorious Historical Monument a changing appearance throughout the seasons.

D-DAY CLUSTER

On June 6th, 1944, the Landing Beaches made history by becoming the greatest battlefield of all time. History for peace and liberty is expressed under open skies in natural settings, as well as in the museums of the Battle of Normandy.

EVENTS

- May 26 to June 10: D-Day Festival Normandy

For its 12th edition, this festival celebrates the anniversary of the Allies landing in Normandy on June 6, 1944, and the newfound freedom this brought.

- June 15 to September 22: Cathedral of Light

Come admire the magnificent sounds and light show on the facade of the Rouen Cathedral. The theme of this not-to-be-missed summer event: William the Conqueror and the Vikings.

The Vasterival Garden in Sainte-Marguerite-sur-Mer

The William Farcy Floral Park in Offranville

The William Farcy lies on 2.5 hectares of land, and is a succession of themed gardens. It is undeniably charming, with its lake, stream and waterfall - not to mention its more than 2,500 species of plants and one hundred rose bushes.

The Hanging Gardens

Rouelles Park

Rouelles Park, which covers nearly 160 hectares, has a number of architecturally amazing tourist attractions, from its perennial garden to the manor and its noteworthy collection of traditional objects.

The Silent Garden of the Carmel Monastery

Right in the heart of Le Havre, this silent garden is a haven for contemplation, meditation and prayer. The space, which is open to everyone, is ideal for those seeking a moment of inner-reflection.

Saint-Roch Square

Located halfway between the beach and the city centre, Saint-Roch Square is two hectares of peaceful walks surrounded by beautiful specimens like the Virginia tulip, the Atlas cedar and the eucalyptus.

The Graville Abbey Gardens

The Graville Abbey is of great historical importance, and is surrounded by gardens rich in rare species, including the Irish yews and the centuries-old Lebanese cedar.

The Juno Beach Centre is a commemorative venue honouring the 45,000 Canadians who perished during WWII. It is an emblematic cultural site of Normandy, and represents the war efforts of Canada's entire population. It was created in 2003 by veterans and volunteers, its main mission being to make this (his)story better-known through educational and commemorative actions.

The Importance of the Poppy



Along the sites of the D-Day Landings in Normandy, you will often find red poppies. In Canada, the United Kingdom, Australia and other countries, the poppy has become a symbol of grief, hope and remembrance for the individuals who fought and died during all wars.

The origins of how and why the poppy gained such a prominent place in the act of remembrance date back to the First World War, when this delicate flower would grow on lands that were once battlefields. The lands of the Belgian region of Flanders inspired Canadian physician Lieutenant-Colonel

McCrae to write the famous poem, "In Flanders Fields" in 1915, which references the poppies that bloomed between the newly constructed graves of soldiers who had died in battle. Soon after the war, McCrae's poignant poem inspired many Commonwealth countries to adopt the poppy as a symbol of remembrance. Individuals continue to wear artificial poppies each year on November 11, the anniversary of the Armistice agreement that marked the end of the First World War, and a day of remembrance and recognition of all those who served in military operations. In Normandy today, throughout the year poppies are placed on beaches, as well as museums and memorial sites dedicated to the D-Day Landings. Families whose ancestors served in the Second World War often leave poppies at various sites along the beaches in tribute to their loved ones.

In Normandy, as in many regions and countries around the world, the poppy remains an enduring symbol of grief, remembrance and gratitude for those who have served and made the ultimate sacrifice during the Second World War and all wars.

This journey encompasses eight listed sites, all of which were selected not only for their historical significance and exceptional universal value, but also for their focus on sustainable development.

Château de Bournazel and its exceptionnal gardens

Château de Bournazel in the Aveyron department is considered to be one of the most beautiful Renaissance castles in the South of France, known notably for the quality of its sculpted decor and its innovative architecture.

The Montauban Gardens: an extraordinary park

Look out! Rhinoceros, tigers and lions are right behind the bushes, and just around the corner with the park's new augmented reality application. This usually quiet garden in Montauban has become the world's first "mini public theme park" operating via visitors' mobile phones.

- The Way of Saint-James: 20 years a part of UNESCO

It's been 20 years since the Way of Saint-James became listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

- March 3 and 4: L'Art des Jardins Show

A meeting place for plant enthusiasts, this year's I'Art des Jardins will focus on the language of flora.

- April to October: The Cévennes National Park Nature Festival

A variety of activities are being organized, including strolls and hikes, guided visits, performances... You'll find everything you need to discover the area through its seasons.

- June 4: Reopening of the Gallo-Roman Villa of Séviac

After one and a half years of renovations, restoration and enhancement of the ancient mosaics, the Gallo-Roman villa of Séviac, in Eauze, is about to reopen its doors to the public.

- From June 16 to September 23: Picasso at the Fabre Museum

The "Donner à voir" exhibition provides a fresh look on a dozen or so of Picasso's milestone moments.

CARCASSONNE: A UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE SITE



Carcassonne boasts two UNESCO World Heritage Sites: its Medieval City and the Canal du Midi. Visitors here are immediately immersed into 2,000 years of history, and can admire Europe's most imposing medieval city, which is in an exceptional state of conservation. The 16th-century banks of the Canal du Midi border the Bastide Saint Louis, the new city built in 1247.

EVENTS

- July 15 to 31: The Carcassonne Festival

This unique summer festival takes place in the heart of the old city, and showcases a number of different themes, with theater, circus, opera, dance, and music concerts. The Carcassonne Festival is one of France's largest, and the programming keeps getting bigger and better, with a growing number of national and international artists.

- July 14: Embracing the City

More than 70,000 people gather on the shores of the Aude River to celebrate the national holiday. An incredibly colourful fireworks display lasts for more than 25 explosive minutes, and ends with an awe-inspiring grandiose finale.

- End of August: The Carcassonne Feria

Typical of the South of France, this festive event fills the streets with salsa, flamenco and Occitan musicians. For several days, young and old alike wander around the city to the joyful rhythms in the air.

Roman History Museum: the countdown has begun

More than 5,000 works - some of which will be revealed to the public for the first time -, will be exhibited around a 3,500m2 space, depicting over 22 centuries of the city's history! Throughout their visit, guests can stay interactive via the latest technologies (augmented reality, computer graphics...) on more than 65 multimedia devices. On the ground floor, a transversal space allows open access to the archaeological gardens, where ancient vegetables have been reintroduced and planted to represent Roman cuisine.

Regional gastronomy will also be showcased here, with two restaurants: one fast food and one fine dining establishment run by grand chef, Franck Putelat. Putelat is from Carcassonne and has been awarded two Michelin stars, a silver Bocuse and a 17/20 rating from Gault & Millau. Top your visit with an ascent to the green rooftop terrace, which offers a spectacular 360° view of Nîmes.

Nîmes, a candidate for UNESCO World Heritage: "Antiquity to the Present"

This UNESCO World Heritage recognition would be an acknowledgement of the work the City of Nîmes has undertaken over the last few years to help valorize its heritage. It would also have great symbolic significance for the generations to come, who will be responsible for pursuing the city's development while drawing inspiration from its past. UNESCO jury deliberations: July 2018.

EVENTS

- From April 28 to 30: 9th Edition of Spartacus - the Great Roman Games

All weekend long, shopkeepers play their roles (good-humouredly, of course!) within their themed villages: The Estate of the Gods, The Gladiator Village, The Village of the Indomitables... Château de Chantilly



Discover one of the jewels of France's cultural heritage. Located in a preserved natural setting, close to Paris and 20 minutes from Paris Charles de Gaulle Airport, the Domaine de Chantilly was built up from the Middle Ages by its illustrious owners: Constable Anne de Montmorency, the Bourbon-Condé dynasty and subsequently Henri d'Orléans, Duke of Aumale. Today it is home to the Château, the Gardens and the Great Stables.



Over 115 hectares, the Château de Chantilly's park is the glorious result of creations built up over various eras: the gardens à la française designed by André Le Nôtre in the 17th century, the Anglo-Chinese gardens from the end of the 18th century, and the English gardens built in the 19th century.

The large French parterre provides the most dazzling views of the visit. It includes vast mirrors of water, numerous jets and fountains as well as an exceptional set of statues. Of all the gardens created by André Le Nôtre, Chantilly was his favourite

The Anglo-Chinese garden was designed by architect Jean-François Leroy in 1773 for Prince Louis-Joseph de Bourbon-Condé (1736-1818). It includes a Hamlet of five, small rustic houses, which were an inspiration for Marie-Antoinette's own hamlet in Versailles.

Finally, the English garden is located between the Château and the Great Stables. It was designed during the Restoration in 1819 by architect Victor Dubois for Prince Louis-Joseph de Bourbon-Condé, and is enhanced by romantic structures such as the Temple of Venus. Twice a year it plays host to the Chantilly Flower Show, the gardening world's leading event.

Château de Versailles

Part of the UNESCO World Heritage of Humanity list for the past 30 years, the Château de Versailles is one of France's most beautiful realizations of 17th-century art. Housing the Hall of Mirrors designed by Jules Hardouin Mansart, it was successively a hunting lodge and a seat of power.

At the foot of the palace, the gardens created by André Le Nôtre are characteristic of the famous "French garden." The Gardener to the King mastered this formal style perfectly and made great use of it in Versailles, particularly along the Grande Perspective. The royal estate of Trianon, designed for more intimate moments, is home to the Grand Trianon and Petit Trianon palaces, as well as the Queen's Hamlet. The estate contains

TO SEE

The Groves

Created by famous architect André Le Nôtre, the groves of Versailles have undergone numerous changes over the centuries. Fountains and statues adorn this space, which is where the King often strolled.

architectural gems and magnificent gardens, while its diversity and ornamentation give it a unique charm.

L'Orangerie

Only accessible during guided visits, the majestic orangery is but a few metres from the Château. Its main gallery is more than 150 metres long, and is home to orange trees, palms and oleanders from all over Europe.

The Parterres

The gardens, located right in front of the Château, extend out into different parterres. A combination of water and green spaces, these surfaces create impressive visual effects, from where you can admire Le Nôtre's elegant botanical embroidery.

The Pools and Fountains

Water, which reflects the sky and the light, is an essential element of the Château de Versailles gardens, whether it is cascading within the groves, or gushing from the fountains. The pools, landscaped from the 1670s onwards, represent the four seasons.

In 1857, Gustave Thuret discovered a wild and wonderful Cap d'Antibes. He bought five hectares, had a villa built and began the creation of a fabulous park, one of the first acclimatization gardens on the French Riviera. Now, having been left to the State by Thuret's heirs, the property is managed by INRA, the French National Institute for Agricultural Research.

There are ten ponds here, where red mullets and ouassou are raised (the only ouassou hatchery in the Caribbean!), a landscaped green area with citrus trees, royal palms, bamboos, mango trees, papyrus, breadfruit trees... Come to do a bit of line fishing, to enjoy a picnic and relax with the family.
